A Message from Pastor Scott Klimke

I was able to speak with Pastor Jonathan yesterday. If you don't know, he was hospitalized on Friday after his heart began to race and would not slow down for a disturbing period of time. His time in the hospital began in Indiana, with him eventually being transferred to Shadyside Hospital in Pittsburgh where his heart procedure was done about six weeks ago now. Thankfully, Pastor Jonathan was able to come home from the hospital on Sunday evening, but the cause of his episode with a racing heart is unknown. There are presently three theories, with all of them still viable possibilities.

On Tuesday, Pastor Jonathan was cleared to begin cardiac rehab. He was also cleared to drive and lift more than was allowed previously. The clearances enabled him to hold one-year-old Andrea for the first time in about a month and a half. You can imagine this was a special treat. But still recovering, holding Andrea fatigued Pastor Jonathan in a relatively short period of time. The time of his return to work is still unknown and likely will remain so for the foreseeable future. Pastor Jonathan is itching to get back at it as soon as possible, but if you can't fight city hall, you also can't fight the limitations of flesh and blood. We'll just have to see how things go.

Covering some of Pastor Jonathan's responsibilities during his convalescence, I will be conducting a funeral service for a member of Benscreek Lutheran before Bible study on Wednesday evening. I will also be conducting a funeral service for our own Jane Hagins on Tuesday morning. Please know your pastors appreciate your prayers and need them whether it be for healing or the stamina and energy caring for you sometimes requires.

In Pastor Jonathan's absence, an ice cream social for our families with children has been planned for after the worship service on Saturday, August 20th. A similar event was held just before Pastor Jonathan's sick leave began. It featured a very heartening turnout and some of those involved told me

in late June they wanted to try something similar not just in August, but also at other points throughout the fall. And so, if you're a parent or grandparent, put August 20th on your calendar and come out with the kids in your lives for some fun and fellowship. I know Pastor Jonathan was excited to hear about the scheduling of the ice cream social when I spoke to him yesterday.

Give now for Eastern Europe Crisis Response

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9).

Friends, I write to you again about our neighbors in Eastern Europe. First, I thank you for your outpouring of prayers and generosity — you are making a difference in the lives of people impacted by the war in Ukraine.

Your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response during this crisis are already at work. Because of your generosity, \$1 million will support the Lutheran World Federation and these member churches:

They are distributing hygiene supplies, food, medicine, bedding and psychosocial and pastoral care to refugees and internally displaced people, most of whom are women and children.

Financial Update

When the congregational council recently reviewed financial reports for May, very little had changed. By way of example, last year's property expenses and this year's property expenses were separated by just \$250.14 and last year's wages and this year's wages were separated by just \$74.89. This stability in Mount Calvary's largest areas of expense speaks to the great job being done by your elected leaders. Have you said, "Thank you" to one of those leaders lately? Are they regularly a part of your prayer life?

There's also stability when it comes to the income side of the equation. We continue to feel the impact of the pandemic slowdown and even more so the impact of members moving out of our area, but May income was still slightly higher than it was a year ago. Along with those effective leaders, may we all just continue doing our part; maintaining our previous giving as a baseline and increasing when and where possible.

Condensed Worship for Sunday, July 10, 2022

Prayer of the Day

P: O Lord God, your mercy delights us, and the world longs for your loving care. Hear the cries of everyone in need and turn our hearts to love our neighbors with the love of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

First Reading: Deuteronomy 30:9-14

The Lord your God will make you abundantly prosperous in all your undertakings, in the fruit of your body, in the fruit of your livestock, and in the fruit of your soil. For the Lord will again take delight in prospering you, just as he delighted in prospering your ancestors, when you obey the Lord your God by observing his commandments and decrees that are written in this book of the law, because you turn to the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul. Surely, this commandment that I am commanding you today is not too hard for you, nor is it too far away. It is not in heaven, that you

should say, "Who will go up to heaven for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?" Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, "Who will cross to the other side of the sea for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?" No, the word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe.

P: The word of the Lord,

A: Thanks be to God!

Psalm 25:1-10

P: To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul.

A: My God, I put my trust in you; let me not be put to shame, nor let my enemies triumph over me.

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, to the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae: Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit. For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

P: The word of the Lord,

A: Thanks be to God!

Gospel: Luke 10:25-37

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

P: The gospel of the Lord.

A: Praise to you, O Christ!

Sermon by Pastor Scott Klimke

Two weeks ago, in our reading from Luke, Jesus set his face toward Jerusalem where a cross awaited him. Jesus was going to love God and neighbor with everything he had and no matter what came next; even if next was a shameful and torturous death. But there was always the chance he might change his mind. In the construction of his gospel, Luke draws unique attention to this prospect. There are fourteen chapters and six hundred and fifteen verses between the moment Jesus sets his face towards Jerusalem and the cross itself. By way of comparison, there are six hundred and some verses in all of Mark's gospel. Luke draws unique attention to all the temptations which could have turned Jesus back from the cross and our salvation. And guess what! Many times, we were the temptations. Sinning and sinning we could have at any time convinced Jesus we weren't worth the price of the cross.

Imagine what it must have felt like when the lawyer in today's reading from Luke tried to demonstrate that he was smarter than God in the flesh. God's upbraiding of Job in the Old Testament tells us it probably didn't go over well. Or imagine what it would have felt like when some Samaritans refused to welcome Jesus just after he turned towards Jerusalem and its cross. We know James and John wanted to torch the offending Samaritans with fire from heaven. Such was the enmity between Jews and Samaritans. They were like our own Hatfields and McCoys. Received so ungraciously in Samaria, Jesus was tempted to participate in this feud. He could have said, "I'm not dying for you dogs." But it didn't happen. Going there to die for all, Jesus kept walking towards Jerusalem and its cross. In fact, not so long after being insulted in Samaria, Jesus today tells us a parable that puts a Samaritan in the best possible light. It just goes to show there's Jesus and then there's us. Even though he shares in our humanity, Jesus is way more gracious, way more obedient, way more steadfast in his love than we are and we had best not forget it. But unfortunately, we can forget that there's Jesus and then there's us.

I'd suggest the temptation to forget that there's Jesus and then there's us becomes particularly strong when we encounter Scripture's dos and don'ts. This part of Scripture, often referred to as the Law, is very much present in our readings from Scripture today. In our reading from Deuteronomy, God's commandments and ordinances are presented as Israel's path to prosperity in the Promised Land it shall soon enter. In our psalm, the psalmist asserts God's steadfast love and faithfulness shall not depart from those who walk God's way. And in our reading from Luke, where the Law is referenced by Jesus himself, a lawyer, a supposed expert on the Law, shows himself to be aware that Scripture often encourages us to love God first and foremost, as we also love our neighbors as an extension of self. If we're not careful, all of these laws and calls to achievement, calls to be superman or superwoman, can lead us to forget there's Jesus and then there's us.

If we want and with the seeming encouragement of all of God's dos and don'ts, we can very easily read the Bible not as testimony to how we desperately needed Jesus to keep his face set towards Jerusalem and its cross, but as a how-to-manual detailing how we can save ourselves all on our own. This likely happens in today's reading from Luke. Charitably we might say the lawyer it describes takes it upon himself to test Jesus because he wants to make sure Jesus is the real deal so he's not misled by Jesus in his faith journey. But as things develop, we're also told the lawyer wants to justify himself. For Lutherans, in particular, this smacks of what we often call works righteousness; the desire to justify ourselves before God on the basis of our own works. For Lutherans, there's only one way to be justified before God and that's for God to do it God's self through the grace at work in Jesus' blood and the Holy Spirit's gift of faith. We've been striving to keep the Church honest and open about this for over five hundred years now. But all the commandments featured in Scripture can complicate this endeavor.

As one strong indication of this possibility, when today's lawyer asks about eternal life and Jesus brings us the Law, the lawyer automatically assumes God's dos and don'ts are there to get us into heaven on our own. In referencing the Law, Jesus was likely testing the lawyer who was testing him. As he refenced God's dos and don'ts, Jesus likely wanted the lawyer to say, "It's not me, Jesus, it's not the commandments Jesus, it's you Jesus who are the resurrection and the life." But the lawyer flunked the test given in response to his own test. He said the personal knowing and keeping of God's commandments was the resurrection and the life. Jesus neither agrees not disagrees. He simply says those who love God and neighbor as an extension of self shall live. Is this to be for one second, one minute, one hour, one week, one month, or for all eternity? Jesus doesn't say. How are we going to fill in the blank he leaves open?

Hopefully not by forgetting there's Jesus and then there's us. As they did for a lawyer, the commandments of God shall always be there to tempt us to think we can save ourselves apart from Jesus, but we can't. Jesus is the resurrection and the life. Jesus is the vine and we the branches who have no life apart from him. It's why our reading from Colossians clearly says we don't rescue ourselves, but that God rescues us through Jesus who is our Redeemer. There's Jesus and then there's us. He's the Redeemer and we're the redeemed. When the commands of Scripture begin to take us where a certain lawyer took himself, we need to say what he didn't say. In, by, and through the Holy Spirit, we need to say, "It's not you, commandments, it's not me, it's Jesus who is the resurrection and the life." But even so, we can remember that there's Jesus and then there's us and still give the commandments of God their due.

This happens when we remember there's now and then there's later. Being the resurrection and life, Jesus has later handled. But as for now, it's more up in the air and much more responsive to what we do or don't do. As we live out now rather than later, we know that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. We also know that no matter how things go, very good, very bad, or inbetween, God shall make all things work together for good. But now, as in now rather than later, we can make things easier for God as God sews and weaves all things together for good. It happens when we know and keep God's commandments.

As we remember there's Jesus and then there's us, this is the present purpose of God's commandments. The commandments teach us how to make our here and now as good as it can be. The commandments teach how we work with God rather than against God as God makes all things work together for good. It's why our psalmist describes himself as a sinner who has no personal claim to salvation, but nonetheless shall have a better life when and if he keeps God's commandments. It's why Israel received the Law after it was already out of Egypt and on its way into the Promised Land. The commandments hadn't saved them from nasty, old Pharaoh. God did. The commandments hadn't gotten them through the wilderness. God did. But the commandments would make life in the wilderness and in the Promised Land far better than it would otherwise be. As we remember that there's Jesus and then us, the commandments teach us how to make our here and now as good as it can be.

And so, go be a Good Samaritan. It's how Jesus concludes our reading from Luke. He doesn't say, "Go and earn yourself eternal life." He says, "Go and be a Good Samaritan. Go and practice love and mercy for the benefit of all." It's what we're here to do and what the commandments of God encourage us to do. We're not here to become the resurrection and the life ourselves. We're here to be Good Samaritans; to practice the love and mercy for all prescribed by the commandments of God. It won't make life perfect. But our love and our mercy for all will make things better. And better is all there shall be until Jesus himself brings eternal life forward forever and ever for all who have the Holy Spirit's gift of faith in him. Amen!

P: We give thanks for the saints who revealed your love and mercy in this life. Inspired by their witness, strengthen us to live in hope. God of grace,

A: hear our prayer.

P: God of every time and place, in Jesus' name and filled with your Holy Spirit, we entrust these spoken prayers and those in our hearts into your holy keeping.

A: Amen.
